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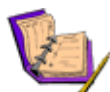

Sad News

Confirmation of Permanent Residence (COPR) is replaces the Record of Landing

Every person who lands in Canada as a permanent resident is no longer given an IMM 1000 Record of Landing document. The COPR now is the document issued at time of entry and replaces the Record of Landing.

The COPR must be kept as part of your child's adoption records as they'll require it when applying for Old Age Pension through Service Canada.

documents are irreplaceable.

Rwanda has recently lifted its moratorium on international adoption, and The Children's Bridge is currently undergoing the relicensing process for this adoption program. Although we will not have official information available until our license has been approved, some basic requirements for this program include:

- Requirements:
 - Applicants must be married for a minimum of one-year at time of dossier submission
 - Must be over age 21, with minimum 7-year difference between adoptive applicant and child to be adopted
 - Applicants must be free from criminal record.
 - Applicants must be in good physical and emotional health.
- Children will be 18+ months at time of referral
- Children with various special needs such as HIV, Hepatitis, hearing and vision loss etc are also available for adoption.

- One trip of approximately 6-weeks is required.

ADOPTION PROGRAM NEWS

The Children's Bridge is now able to work with any Hague accredited adoption services providers in the State of Florida. Please contact us with specific requests or if you would like assistance with completing an adoption from Florida.

Adoption by Shepherd Care (ASC)

This adoption program currently has three available spaces and we have 2 families in process to adopt from Florida. The timelines remain consistent with families being selected by expectant mothers approximately 9 - 18 months after their file is active in Florida. Babies are approximately 5 - 10 days old when placed in their adoptive families. Please review requirements for this program carefully, as Florida is quite strict on requirements for adoptive families.

Program Changes

Adoption by Shepherd's Care has made some recent changes in their policies, and will now be prioritizing the files of families with known infertility issues, are childless, are experiencing secondary infertility, or have previously adopted a child through ASC or another adoption program.

Program Possibilities

- **Zambia** - we are currently accepting applications for this adoption program, and will prioritize applications for those open to children living with HIV. Please note: spaces available are for married couples only (no single applicant spaces available at this time).

Republic of Zambia Adoption Program

We are now able to accept two (2) new families into this adoption program. Applicants must be married (our quota for singles is currently full), and live in a diverse area of the country. Please review the Zambia program requirements before inquiring about this adoption program - you must meet all requirements and be able to complete the long in-country stay (6 - 7 months). Applicants are able to begin parental leave through EI once they take custody of their child in Zambia (approximately 3 - 4 weeks after arrival).

At this point, The Children's Bridge has completed two adoptions from Zambia, and we have one relative adoption in the final stages of visa processing. We have one family currently waiting for a child proposal from Zambia. There are two spaces available in this adoption program.

We are currently accepting applications for this adoption program. We currently have 4 families in process to adopt from India. We are currently working on expanding this adoption program so that we are able to work with families across Canada. CARA is now accepting families for both their mainstream program and their special needs stream. Most children are over age 2 at time of referral, and they have still emphasized the need for families for older children. There are many older children waiting for families in India so CARA is able to match families fairly quickly who are open to children over the age of 7 or 8 years old.

Family's Progress

We currently have one family in-country finalizing their child's adoption and completing final paperwork in India. We have one family that has been matched with a child in India, and one family currently waiting for a child proposal. Our fourth family is currently completing the homestudy process.

OCI Status:

CARA's guideline's certainly say that adopted children are eligible for OCI status - this is from the US State department: CARA's [Guidelines Governing the Adoption of Children, 2015](#) state that an adopted Indian child shall be entitled to receive an Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) card, if found eligible. For more information about the procedure for applying for OCI status for your child, please contact the nearest Indian Embassy or consulate.

Relinquishing Indian Passport and Renouncing Citizenship

Once families are home in Canada with their children, they must complete a formal process renouncing Indian citizenship (dual citizenship is not possible in this adoption program). This **must** be done within 3-years of receiving Canadian Citizenship (or Record of Landing if you complete the Permanent Resident Visa route). It is **very important** to complete this step, as failure to do so may result in penalties when your child travels back to India at any point in their life. It is a punishable offence under the Indian Passport Act, 1967, to apply for an Indian passport, continue to hold an Indian passport, get an Indian passport re-issued or travel on an Indian passport after acquiring foreign citizenship. Under Indian law, Persons of Indian Origin (PIOs) who have acquired foreign citizenship are required to surrender their Indian passports to the nearest Indian Mission/Post immediately after acquisition of foreign citizenship.

Foreigners Regional Registration Office and NOC

There has been a new requirement put in place by the Indian government that all families must obtain a "No Objection Certificate" (NOC) from the Foreigners Regional Registration Office (FRRO) before you bring your child home from India. This is also a requirement for adoptive parents who hold OCI status and will travel on a Canadian passport. This NOC is essentially an exit permit and families will need to apply for it at the FRRO before departing India.

The adoptive parents are advised to first contact the FRRO office to request an appointment date and bring along with them the printout of the online application form and relevant documents pertaining to their adoption. The exit permit(s) shall be granted within three working days after submission.

I am happy to provide traveling families with more detailed information about this process once they are at this stage in their adoption process. **Please note:** It is highly recommended that all families travel to Delhi in order to apply to the Delhi FRRO office. The Delhi office is more familiar with the process and has been able to keep to the 3-day turnaround time. As well, the CARA office is close in proximity, which means documents that are needed can be accessed in person and in a timely fashion by the adoptive family or the FRRO officers.

South Korea Program

The Year of the DOG (2018, 2006, 1994, 1982, 1970) - Dogs are honest and loyal just like the family pet. If you are born under the sign of the dog you are helpful and you have integrity but you are not so good at communicating so you appear stubborn.

Just as we celebrate the calendar New Year, 2018, other countries and cultures are preparing to celebrate the Lunar New Year, February 15-17. In Korea this celebration is called Seollal.

Seollal is one of South Korea's largest holidays of the year. The primary purpose of Seollal is to pay respect to ancestors, but it has also become a mechanism of keeping families together. As parents and siblings drift apart due to work, school, marriage, and other obligations, Seollal brings the family back together for a time of respect of happiness. The people of South Korea often receive time off to celebrate this holiday.

Prior to the Seollal celebration, people celebrating have many preparations to make. In South Korea, many gifts are given, so there is much shopping to be done. People must also travel to a single location to celebrate with their families, so transportation must be arranged. Seollal is one of the busiest travel periods for South Korea, so it is important for people to purchase tickets and book accommodations well in advance. Food must also be purchased for the family meals and ancestral rites.

- Gifts

Gift giving has become a major aspect of the Seollal holiday in South Korea. While the types of gifts given will vary depending on financial situations, individual preference, and family traditions, there are some gifts that are standard for the holiday. Nowadays, some of the most frequently gifted presents include money and gift cards to department stores and shops. Children often give gifts like ginseng and health products to their parents. Other popular gift choices include toiletries, sweets, fish, and fruit.

- Ancestral Rites

On the morning of the Seollal holiday, family members offer ancestral rites to their deceased relatives. These rites are relatively humble, but they usually consist of simple ritual foods and good prayers. The purpose of these rites is to honor the memory of ancestors and wish them good fortune.

- Games

During the day of Seollal, it is common for people celebrating the holiday to play games with each other. One of the most popular games is yutnori. Yutnori is a board game played with sticks and has fairly simple rules. It can be played in teams, so all members of the family can engage in some fun competition to reconnect during the New Year holiday. One of the other major activities to celebrate during the lunar New Year in South Korea is yeon-naligi. Yeon-naligi is the Korean term for kite flying. If the weather is nice, both children and adults go outside to fly brightly colored kites in the sky. Meanwhile, members of the family will share stories about the past year. Popular topics include love interests, job promotions, jokes, and the future. Speaking about disease, death, and other dark topics is frowned upon during Seollal.

- Clothing

During meals and Seollal celebrations in South Korea, it is customary for all members of the family to wear hanbok, the traditional clothing of Korean people. These clothes are simple dresses for women or vests and pants for men. Hanbok outfits often are often colored with bright reds, pinks, or oranges.

- Food

Seollal is known for its large feast of traditional Korean food. One of the main dishes during this holiday is tteokguk. Tteokguk is a soup made of beef, vegetables, egg, and rice cakes. According to Korean traditions, this dish is supposed to promote longevity through life-extending properties. Galbijjim is another dish commonly enjoyed during Seollal. Galbijjim are beef short ribs that are steamed and sliced into small pieces and cooked in a pot of soy sauce, pepper, sesame oil, scallions, and sugar. The dish is slow cooked so that the meat is tender and full of a savory flavor. These dishes are sometimes paired with three-color namul, a popular Korean vegetable dish. While the exact composition of the dish varies depending on area and preference, the three-color namul is made up of three vegetables that are colored green, white, and brown. Popular choices include spinach, fern shoots, and balloon flower roots. After finishing a meal during the lunar New Year in Korea, it is customary for the entire family to pay respect to ancestors with a brief prayer.

- Sebae

Sebae (세배 , 歲拜 , *worship elders*) is a ritual of filial piety that is traditionally observed on Seollal. Dressed in traditional clothing , children wish their elders (grandparents, parents and aunts and uncles) a happy new year by performing a deep traditional bow (rites with more than one bow involved are usually for the deceased) and the words *saehae bok mani badeuseyo* (Hangul : 새해 복 많이 받으세요) , or "Please receive good fortune for the New Year". Elders typically reward this gesture by giving children new year's money, or "pocket money" (usually in the form of crisp paper money) in silk bags made with beautiful traditional designs, as well as offering words of wisdom (dōkdam). Historically, parents gave out rice cakes (ddeok) and fruit to their children.

Referral News

A referral for a very adorable 8-month baby boy was received early this month. The prospective adoptive parents are over the moon with joy.

Court Dates and Travel Notices

Two of our families attended court this month and now they eagerly wait for news of their second trip.

One of our families waiting for the COPR, chose to travel to Korea before this important immigration document was issued. They understood that the wait could be long but decided to take the risk and be in

Korea with their child and begin the bonding process. As the Adoption Order was confirmed and the COPR application was submitted SWS was able to place the child in his parents' care. Please know that if you do decide to go travel before the COPR is issued we cannot guarantee the issuing timeline. We've seen as short as 4 weeks and as long as 12 weeks.

On your first trip to Korea SWS will arrange for two visits with baby and foster family, a third may be squeezed in depending on your travel timeline and SWS schedules.

There are many stages of waiting during an adoption journey, and waiting to travel to receive your child (second trip) can be the toughest one - my advice is to stay busy and continue to get ready to welcome the newest addition to your family. If you need support during this wait please do not hesitate to reach out to me.

Referral timelines can take anywhere from 1 to 8 months, estimated, and matching is not completed in any order. Timelines from referral acceptance to travel for court (first trip) can take an estimated 7 to 12 months once referral acceptance is submitted to SWS. Each case is different and court date notices can be set out of order. Timelines cannot be guaranteed.

Estimated second travel notice is issued once Confirmation of Permanent Residence (COPR) is received by

SWS can take anywhere from 6 to 16 weeks from court date.

SWS Guest House Update: The SWS Guesthouse is closed for an indefinite period and we are unsure as to why. I have recently updated the Referral Booklet/Travel guide current hotel/accommodation information.

AdopTALK

You should plan to attend our 2 day AdopTALK workshop before or shortly after your completed home study is submitted, as the certificate must be included in your dossier for Korea. All details for [AdopTALK](#) are on our website.

Attendance at AdopTALK is mandatory no matter where a family live or what other training they take.

What to Expect at the Adoption Court Hearing:

Below is some information from SWS regarding what to expect at the court hearings in Korea. We hope that all families will feel prepared as they attend court for the finalization of their adoption, and encourage all families to review the questions below and how they would answer each one. Families will either attend court on a Thursday or Friday, and SWS has compiled some questions that families have been asked by each judge. We advise that families should prepare themselves for all questions regardless of which day they attend court.

The following are examples of questions that a judge may ask:

1. Did you meet with your prospective adoptive child? How was it? How did the child do?
2. If you have a child/children, does he/she/they know about this adoption? How did he/she/they respond?
3. After meeting with the prospective adoptive child, was there any change in your decision to adopt?
4. Questions about the occupations of the parents
5. Who is going to be the primary caretaker?
6. How are you going to raise your child (your parenting plan)?
7. What is your motivation to adopt from Korea? Is there any community around you or your neighborhood that can support your adoption?
8. How long has it been since you first applied for adoption?
9. When were you matched with your child? Or how long has it been since the matching?
10. Was there any difficulty in pursuing the adoption process?
11. Lastly do you have anything to say?

Some judges may ask questions based on the homestudy and psychological evaluation. Reviewing your own homestudy and psychological evaluation report beforehand would be very helpful.

When you answer the judge, you should be looking at him/her, not the translator, although he/she may not be able to understand what you say. And please smile! Don't be nervous! You just show how much you love your child and just be truthful!

Families may be permitted to leave the Court House right after their short hearing. After court, families find their own way back to their hotel either via taxi or subway.

Information on Adopting a Second Child from South Korea

We have received information from SWS about families that are interested in pursuing a second adoption from South Korea. The Ministry of Health and Welfare has agreed to accept families who are under the age of 50 at time of placement for second adoptions, or for first adoptions if the family is of Korean heritage or an adult adoptee.

Prospective adoptive parents would be required to receive special permission regarding their age in advance. If a family is interested in completing an adoption and is over the age of 45, SWS will ask the Ministry for permission before the family can proceed.

The conditions in which the upper age limit for adoptive parents may be 50 at time of placement are as follows:

- Both parents are of Korean heritage, OR
- Either parent is an adoptee themselves (of any heritage), OR
- Parents (of any heritage) already have previously adopted a child from Korea.

Due to the approximate time frame for adoptions from South Korea, SWS has informed us that they would require the family's dossier before they turn 48.

If you meet these requirements and are interested in adopting from South Korea, please do not hesitate to contact me for further details.

Adoption Order and Confirmation of Permanent Residence

Historically, the estimated time for COPR issuing is 4 to 6 weeks after Manila receives paperwork from SWS. However, we've seen as long as 16 weeks for a few cases. SWS will send the immigration paperwork to Manila approximately 1 week after the confirmed adoption order has been issued as there is translation required. SWS will inform us when a family is ready to travel for the second trip once they have received the COPR, not when Manila says they have issued it as we do not want families waiting in Korea for an indefinite and longer stay.

Health Card Application

Please contact Service Ontario before you submit your application to ensure you submit the correct supporting documents with regard to your child's adoption and permanent residence. One of the documents you'll need to bring with you is a copy of the Letter of No Objection issued by The Ministry of Children and Youth Services when they approved the proposed placement shortly after your referral arrived.

Service Ontario will issue the Health Card in your child's Korean birth name. You'll then need to complete a name change on the card once you've completed a legal name change one year after placement and once Canadian Citizenship has been received.

All internationally adopted children are exempt from the 3 month waiting period, please refer to this link and have the information handy when you go to Service Ontario:

Applying for Canadian Citizenship

Families who have returned home must complete the application for Canadian citizenship for their child within 30 days of arriving home. All of the children adopted from Korea will be returning to Canada as permanent residents and therefore families will need to apply for citizenship as it is **not automatically granted** to internationally adopted children.

A copy of the completed application should be scanned and emailed to our agency and I will forward to SWS. The family court in Seoul will not issue Adoption Orders if families do not comply and apply for citizenship. Not applying for citizenship will affect all families in process waiting for their Adoption Order.

Families who have arrived home with their children after November 2016 have been instructed by CIC to have the Adoption Order officially translated. We find this very strange as two original Adoption Orders are given to the adoptive parents, one in Korean and one in English. Families have also had to provide a translated Adoption Order in order to apply for a Canadian Passport. If you have any difficulties, we suggest that you contact CIC to ask specific questions about your application.

Three families have sent in their retainers and are working on their dossiers. These files will be part of the 2018 quota.

I do not have our quota yet for this year but will let you know as soon as I get it. I am hoping it will be similar to previous years (9 files).

If I do not have a signed retainer on hand, you will not be guaranteed a spot in the program.

Once you have received a retainer agreement, you have 30 days to return it to us.

Finalization

As you know, your adoptions will be finalized at the Thai Embassy. We thought that every family had to travel to Ottawa to complete this process, however, we recently learned that our families in the west now have the opportunity to finalize at the Thai Embassy in Vancouver. Good news!

Paperwork Change - Dossier - Effective Immediately

The Ontario Ministry of Children and Youth Services have asked that, along with the home study, we must submit the psychological assessment. Please begin the steps to complete this assessment when you start your home study.

Resource Kit

Once you have paid your initial fees, we will send you your Adoption & Parenting Resource Kit. The kit is generally sent within a month of you signing your retainer. If you haven't yet received your Resource Kit, do let me know.

AdopTALK

You should plan to attend our 2 day AdopTALK workshop about 6 - 8 months before you anticipate receiving your proposal. All details for AdopTALK are on our [website](#) .

Attendance at AdopTALK is mandatory no matter where a family live or what other training they take.

The next AdopTALK workshop in the GTA will be held October 27th and 28th in Newmarket. All details are now [on-line](#) .

Ministry

The Ministry has indicated that they continue to process home studies and updates in 4 - 6 weeks and proposals in 5 - 10 business days.

Waiting Children Program

If you are interested in adopting an older child (over 4 years of age) or a child with special medical needs, this type of adoption will not count in the same quota for mainstream adoptions and the requirements for families adopting older children or those with special needs are not as restrictive (for example, the age of the adoptive applicants and/or other children in the home could be amended). The timeline could be quicker but we don't know by how much.

Please note that this program is also open to single applicants.

If you are interested in this program, please contact me for more detailed information.

Travelling outside of Canada (before adoption finalization)

When you come home with your child and you want to travel with him/her outside of Canada, you are required to obtain a Statutory Declaration from our office (or your provincial ministry for those outside of Ontario) to travel since the adoption is not finalized. The Children's Bridge (or the provincial ministry) is the guardian of the child until the adoption is finalized. Finalization happens approximately 1 year after you arrive home. Please contact me if you are travelling outside of Canada. Children travelling to the US before finalization need to obtain a US visitor's Visa as they are not Canadian Citizens. Please call your local US consulate for further details.

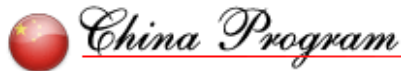
Immigration Sponsorship

Please ensure that you have applied for Immigration Sponsorship approximately 12 - 18 months after your dossier has gone to Thailand. Timelines have become a little unpredictable and we want to make sure that you have been approved to sponsor well before a referral is received. We have just learned that Immigration Sponsorship approvals expire after 2 years and so we have changed when you apply for this.

Once you submit this to immigration you will receive a letter with a UCI # and Application Number on it. Please note these used to be called Kit and Client ID #. Please email this number to me and/or scan and email me a copy of the document. Keep the package that CIC sends to you in a safe place, as you will need to take it to Thailand with you. Immigration paperwork must be completed well before you receive your referral.

Congratulations to the Leslie -Paine family who will travel to China in March to receive their son!

Congratulations to the Liu-Jiang family who has received their son's referral and LSC's from the CCCWA!

We currently have 10 families in process with their dossiers logged in at the CCCWA who are awaiting child proposals. Many of our waiting families have updated their Letters of Approval to expand their child recommendation statements. I would be pleased to set up a conference call to speak with your family about expanding your age range and the special medical needs your family may be open to.

For any new families registering with The Children's Bridge, the China WC program has changed dramatically over the past two years and the program has become an older boy with non-correctable special medical needs adoption program. I have attached a link which outlines the changes in the program

China ratified the Hague in 2008 and the one child policy was lifted almost two years ago. Domestic adoption continues to rise within China and more domestic adoptions have taken place in the past year. International adoption in China continues to decline.

Most of our families who are remaining in this adoption program are looking at expanding their SN`s (missing limbs, missing hands, club foot, congenital heart disease, developmental delays etc.), and increasing their age range if they are open to adopting an older boy (over 7 years of age). The children currently waiting for families on the CCCWA Online System have high non-correctable special medical needs or are older children between 10-14 years of age.
