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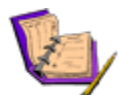

Did You Know?

Giving back doesn't necessarily involve giving money; youth can make a difference simply by giving

their time - great news for all of the poor young people out there! For instance, interested teen adoptees in the Ottawa area can earn volunteer hours by participating in our monthly Connect-A-Kid mentorship program. "Connect-A-Kid" is what the name says - it's all about connecting adoptees. Kids with kids, kids with teens, and teens with teens... you get the picture.

Speaking from personal experience, adoptees don't always feel comfortable talking about adoption with their parents. The goal of Connect-A-Kid is to give kids a safe, inclusive space to interact with adopted peers and mentors who may share similar experiences of growing up in transracial families. But, truth be told, Connect-A-Kid isn't really a serious discussion group - it's fun and informal. We hang out, eat snacks, and play laser tag, soccer, dodgeball - you name it! Yet although these activities are lots of fun, I do maintain that there is something bigger and more significant at play here: it is *so* important for adoptees to have exposure to other people they identify with, be it because of skin colour or family structure. Of course - you don't need to meet up and make a big deal of (or even acknowledge) your similarities if that's not your style... it's just the being together that's important.

It has only been in adulthood that I've had conversations with other adoptees about growing up. It turns out that we have unknowingly shared many of the same perceptions and life experiences, and as such, I often feel an instant rapport with them. It goes without saying that I wish I could have had these "aha, you get it" moments much earlier in my life, but there wasn't a similar mentorship group around when I was growing up. And that is why I volunteer with Connect-A-Kid now!

ADOPTION PROGRAM NEWS

The Children's Bridge is now able to work with any Hague accredited adoption services providers in the State of Florida. Please contact us with specific requests or if you would like assistance with completing an adoption from Florida.

Adoption by Shepherd Care (ASC)

This adoption program currently has two spaces available. We currently have two families on the call-back list. Please contact the Program Manager, Karyn Bakelaar, for further information on this adoption program.

Congratulations are extended to Michael and Lisa, who are now home in Ontario with their baby girl! Congratulations are also extended to Christine and Darren who recently had their adoption finalized in Florida court.

Program Changes

Adoption by Shepherd's Care has made some recent changes in their policies, and will now be prioritizing the files of families with known infertility issues, are childless, are experiencing secondary infertility, or have previously adopted a child through ASC.

USA Tax Laws and Dual Citizenship Status

This correspondence was sent to all family's home with children adopted from the USA, and to new families beginning the adoption process. Please feel free to share this information widely.

Under the *Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act* (FATCA) which was enacted in the USA in 2010, all US citizens must file annual tax returns, as well as report all foreign financial assets. This law also allows the American government (IRS) to access records and information for US citizens from the CRA or larger Canadian financial institutions (some smaller banks and credit unions are exempt).

In most cases, dual citizens will not owe taxes on US tax returns as Canada has a much higher tax rate than does the US. Some saving accounts are exempt from FATCA, such as RRSP's, etc, thanks to FACTA provisions in Bill-C31. That being said, annual tax returns must be filed, and financial assets in your child's name must be reported.

In previous information that had been shared with adoptive families, three options for adoptive families were stated as follows:

- A. Parents and their adopted children can comply with the US legislation (submit annual tax returns/report assets according to law);
- B. Renounce or relinquish the child's US citizenship once Canadian permanent residency was granted;
- C. Parents and the adopted child could simply not comply.

However, it has recently been brought to my attention that Option B (renouncing or relinquishing US citizenship) is not an option. According to US Immigration Law it is not possible for minors to renounce citizenship, nor is it possible for adults to renounce of behalf of an American Citizen. While this link states the age of renunciation to be 16, I have spoken to a few US Hague attorneys that have stated the age is now 21. Additionally, the process of renunciation is long and is somewhat costly (one website said fee increased to \$2300USD, and more if an immigration attorney is involved (see news articles below). There has been some advocacy and organizations that are attempting to have this overturned, such as The Alliance for the Defense of Canadian Sovereignty, but for now the law is in tact and applies to all adoptive families. There is a lawyer in the GTA area that holds free Information Seminars on US taxation, and also will advise you on your options as outlined above. I will share any further information with you that comes my way, and this information will be in the Monthly Update for the next few issues. I have two Hague attorneys in the US investigating whether options exist in the cases of adoption, but at this point it seems adopted children fall under the same laws and regulations as other US ex-pats.

- Zambia - we are currently accepting applications for this adoption program, and will prioritize applications for those open to children living with HIV. Please note: spaces available are for married couples only (no single applicant spaces available at this time).

Family G/K are doing well and are now into their third month of fostering their child in Zambia and will soon be completing their court process. They have been able to provide feedback about their experience so far which will be very beneficial to families that follow.

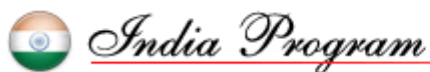
We are now able to accept two (2) new families into this adoption program. Applicants must be married, and live in a diverse area of the country. Please review the Zambia program requirements before enquiring about this adoption program - you must meet all requirements and be able to complete the long in-country stay (6 - 7 months). If you would like more information, please contact the Program Manager, Karyn Bakelaar, for more information.

So far we have completed one adoption from Zambia, and have one relative adoption in the final stages of visa processing. One family is matched with a child and has begun the adoption process in Zambia, and our second family is currently waiting for a child proposal from Zambia.

We are currently accepting applications for this adoption program. We are currently working on expanding this adoption program so that we are able to work with families across Canada. A good overview of this adoption process was published in the Indo-Canadian Voice:

CARA is now accepting families for both their mainstream program and their special needs stream. Most children are over age 2 at time of referral, and they have still emphasized the need for families for older children. There are many older children waiting for families in India so CARA is able to match families fairly quickly who are open to children over the age of 7 or 8 years old.

Family's Progress

We currently have one family waiting to travel to finalize their child's adoption in India, and one family waiting for CARA's approval on their submitted dossier.

Two other families are completing their home study and preparing their dossier for India.

OCI Status:

CARA's guideline's certainly say that adopted children are eligible for OCI status - this is from the US State department: CARA's [Guidelines Governing the Adoption of Children, 2015](#) state that an adopted Indian child shall be entitled to receive an Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) card, if found eligible. For more information about the procedure for applying for OCI status for your child, please contact the nearest Indian Embassy or consulate.

Relinquishing Indian Passport and Renouncing Citizenship

Once families are home in Canada with their children, they must complete a formal process renouncing Indian citizenship (dual citizenship is not possible in this adoption program). This **must** be done within 3-years of receiving Canadian Citizenship (or Record of Landing if you complete the Permanent Resident Visa route). It is **very important** to complete this step, as failure to do so may result in penalties when your child travels back to India at any point in their life. It is a punishable offence under the Indian Passport Act, 1967, to apply for an Indian passport, continue to hold an Indian passport, get an Indian passport re-issued or travel on an Indian passport after acquiring foreign citizenship. Under Indian law, Persons of Indian Origin (PIOs) who have acquired foreign citizenship are required to surrender their Indian passports to the nearest Indian Mission/Post immediately after acquisition of foreign citizenship.

Foreigners Regional Registration Office and NOC

There has been a new requirement put in place by the Indian government that all families must obtain a "No Objection Certificate" (NOC) from the Foreigners Regional Registration Office (FRRO) before you bring your child home from India. This is also a requirement for adoptive parents who hold OCI status and will travel on a Canadian passport. This NOC is essentially an exit permit and families will need to apply for it at the FRRO before departing India.

The adoptive parents are advised to first contact the FRRO office to request an appointment date and bring along with them the printout of the online application form and relevant documents pertaining to their adoption. The exit permit(s) shall be granted within three working days after submission.

I am happy to provide traveling families with more detailed information about this process once they are at this stage in their adoption process. **Please note:** It is highly recommended that all families travel to Delhi in order to apply to the Delhi FRRO office. The Delhi office is more familiar with the

process and has been able to keep to the 3-day turnaround time. As well, the CARA office is close in proximity, which means documents that are needed can be accessed in person and in a timely fashion by the adoptive family or the FRRO officers.

Referral timelines can take anywhere from 1 to 8 months, estimated, and matching is not completed in any order. Timelines from referral acceptance to travel for court (first trip) can take an estimated 7 to 12 months once referral acceptance is submitted to SWS. Each case is different and court date notices can be set out of order. Timelines cannot be guaranteed.

Estimated second travel notice is issued once Confirmation of Permanent Residence (COPR) is received by SWS can take anywhere from 6 to 16 weeks from court date.

SWS Guest House Update: The SWS Guesthouse is closed for an indefinite period and we are unsure as to why. I have recently updated the Referral Booklet/Travel guide current hotel/accommodation information.

AdopTALK

You should plan to attend our 2 day AdopTALK workshop before or shortly after your completed home study is submitted, as the certificate must be included in your dossier for Korea. All details for [AdopTALK](#) are on our website.

Attendance at AdopTALK is mandatory no matter where a family live or what other training they take.

What to Expect at the Adoption Court Hearing:

Below is some information from SWS regarding what to expect at the court hearings in Korea. We hope that all families will feel prepared as they attend court for the finalization of their adoption, and encourage all families to review the questions below and how they would answer each one. Families will either attend court on a Thursday or Friday, and SWS has compiled some questions that families have been asked by each judge. We advise that families should prepare themselves for all questions regardless of which day they attend court.

The following are examples of questions that a judge may ask:

1. Did you meet with your prospective adoptive child? How was it? How did the child do?
2. If you have a child/children, does he/she/they know about this adoption? How did he/she/they respond?
3. After meeting with the prospective adoptive child, was there any change in your decision to adopt?
4. Questions about the occupations of the parents
5. Who is going to be the primary caretaker?
6. How are you going to raise your child (your parenting plan)?
7. What is your motivation to adopt from Korea? Is there any community around you or your neighborhood that can support your adoption?
8. How long has it been since you first applied for adoption?
9. When were you matched with your child? Or how long has it been since the matching?
10. Was there any difficulty in pursuing the adoption process?
11. Lastly do you have anything to say?

Some judges may ask questions based on the homestudy and psychological evaluation. Reviewing your own homestudy and psychological evaluation report beforehand would be very helpful.

When you answer the judge, you should be looking at him/her, not the translator, although he/she

may not be able to understand what you say. And please smile! Don't be nervous! You just show how much you love your child and just be truthful!

Families may be permitted to leave the Court House right after their short hearing. After court, families find their own way back to their hotel either via taxi or subway.

Information on Adopting a Second Child from South Korea

We have received information from SWS about families that are interested in pursuing a second adoption from South Korea. The Ministry of Health and Welfare has agreed to accept families who are under the age of 50 at time of placement for second adoptions, or for first adoptions if the family is of Korean heritage or an adult adoptee.

Prospective adoptive parents would be required to receive special permission regarding their age in advance. If a family is interested in completing an adoption and is over the age of 45, SWS will ask the Ministry for permission before the family can proceed.

The conditions in which the upper age limit for adoptive parents may be 50 at time of placement are as follows:

- Both parents are of Korean heritage, OR
- Either parent is an adoptee themselves (of any heritage), OR
- Parents (of any heritage) already have previously adopted a child from Korea.

Due to the approximate time frame for adoptions from South Korea, SWS has informed us that they would require the family's dossier before they turn 48.

If you meet these requirements and are interested in adopting from South Korea, please do not hesitate to contact me for further details.

Adoption Order and Confirmation of Permanent Residence

Historically, the estimated time for COPR issuing is 4 to 6 weeks after Manila receives paperwork from SWS. However, we've seen as long as 16 weeks for a few cases. SWS will send the immigration paperwork to Manila approximately 1 week after the confirmed adoption order has been issued as there is translation required. SWS will inform us when a family is ready to travel for the second trip once they have received the COPR, not when Manila says they have issued it as we do not want families waiting in Korea for an indefinite and longer stay.

Applying for Canadian Citizenship

Families who have returned home must complete the application for Canadian citizenship for their child within 30 days of arriving home. All of the children adopted from Korea will be returning to Canada as permanent residents and therefore families will need to apply for citizenship as it is not automatically granted to internationally adopted children.

A copy of the completed application should be scanned and emailed to our agency and I will forward to SWS. The family court in Seoul will not issue Adoption Orders if families do not comply and apply for citizenship. Not applying for citizenship will affect all families in process waiting for their Adoption Order.

Families who have arrived home with their children after November 2016 have been instructed by CIC to have the Adoption Order officially translated. We find this very strange as two original Adoption Orders are given to the adoptive parents, one in Korean and one in English. Families have also had to provide a translated Adoption Order in order to apply for a Canadian Passport. If you have any difficulties, we suggest that you contact CIC to ask specific questions about your application.

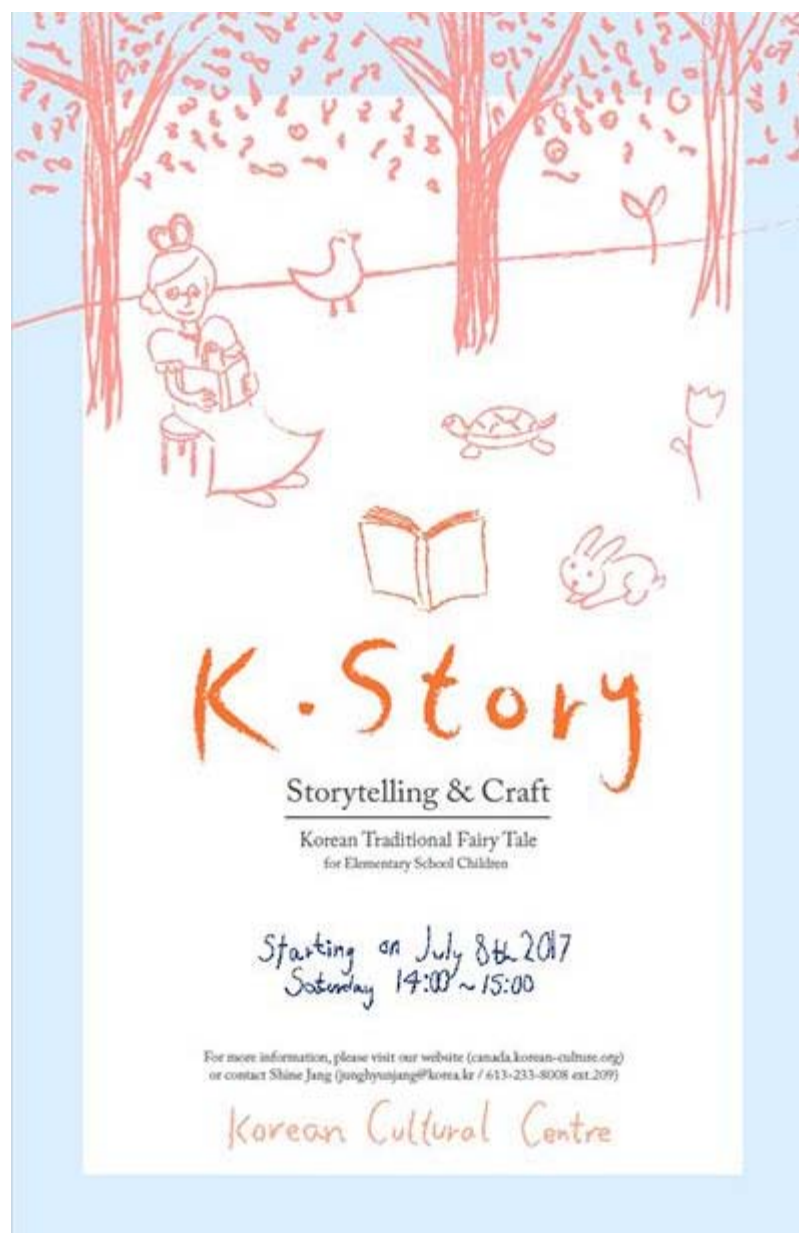
Our family who participated in the May custom homeland visit reported that their trip went very well. Stay tuned for their story in our Fall newsletter.

I am happy to inform you of the upcoming event this year, the 9th Welcome Home.

Welcome Home is a program sponsored by Social Welfare Society since 2008 for adult overseas Korean adoptees to visit and explore the homeland.

This year, the program will begin on August 20th and will last for 7 days, closing on August 26.

The core idea of the program is to match an adoptee with a Korean volunteer and experience the entire program together as a team, which we call the 'buddy system.'

Through their buddies, it is hoped that adoptees will explore Korea in a friendlier way, feel comfortable and invited in their homeland, and eventually build a healthy identity as an adoptee.

The entire cost of the program is sponsored by Social Welfare Society and this also includes accommodations for one day before and one day after the program.

As the opening ceremony is scheduled in the afternoon of August 20th, all participants are expected to arrive in Korea by the morning of August 20th.

As for the departure, the closing ceremony is scheduled in the evening of August 26th, which means all departures should be planned on August 27th or later.

Any overseas Korean adoptees between the age of 20 and 50 are welcomed to apply for the program and should there be an overflow or applicants, the applicants that have not visited Korea before will be given priority.

Application will be closed on July 28th.

I hope many adoptees can get an opportunity to be part of this program and your help and support is the key, which I greatly appreciate in advance.

At this time, 10 families who have signed retainers continue to work on their dossiers. Two of these files are being processed at Foreign Affairs and the Thai Embassy, 4 are awaiting Ministry approval and 4 families are still working on their home study and dossier. Several other families are working on their dossiers but have not yet submitted a retainer.

If I do not have a signed retainer on hand, you will not be guaranteed a spot in the program.

Once you have received a retainer agreement, you have 30 days to return it to us.

Paperwork Change - Dossier - Effective Immediately

The Ontario Ministry of Children and Youth Services have asked that, along with the home study, we must submit the psychological assessment. Please begin the steps to complete this assessment when you start your home study.

AdopTALK

You should plan to attend our 2 day AdopTALK workshop about 6 - 8 months before you anticipate receiving your proposal. All details for AdopTALK are on our [website](#).

Attendance at AdopTALK is mandatory no matter where a family live or what other training they take.

The next AdopTALK will be held October 14th and 15th in Newmarket (GTA). All details are now on-line.

Ministry

The Ministry has indicated that they are processing files in 4 - 6 weeks.

Waiting Children Program

If you are interested in adopting an older child (over 4 years of age) or a child with special medical needs, note that this type of adoption does not fall in the same quota for mainstream adoptions and the requirements for families adopting older children or those with special needs are not as restrictive (for example, the age of the adoptive applicants and/or other children in the home could be amended) and the timeline may be quicker.

Please note that this program is also open to single applicants.

If you are interested in this program, please contact me for more detailed information.

Travelling outside of Canada (before adoption finalization)

When you come home with your child and you want to travel with him/her outside of Canada, you are required to obtain a Statutory Declaration from our office (or your provincial ministry for those outside of Ontario) to travel since the adoption is not finalized. The Children's Bridge (or the provincial ministry) is the guardian of the child until the adoption is finalized. Finalization happens approximately 1 year after you arrive home. Please contact me if you are travelling outside of Canada. Children travelling to the US before finalization need to obtain a US visitor's Visa as they are not Canadian Citizens. Please call your local US consulate for further details.

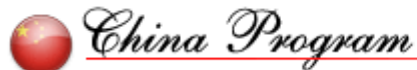
Immigration Sponsorship

Please ensure that you have applied for Immigration Sponsorship approximately two years after your dossier has gone to Thailand or sooner if in the Waiting Children Program. Timelines have become a little unpredictable and we want to make sure that you have been approved to sponsor well before a referral is received. We have just learned that Immigration Sponsorship approvals expire after 2 years and so we have changed when you apply for this.

Once you submit this to immigration you will receive a letter with a UCI # and Application Number on it. Please note these used to be called Kit and Client ID #. Please email this number to me and/or scan and email me a copy of the document. Keep the package that CIC sends to you in a safe place, as you will need to take it to Thailand with you. Immigration paperwork must be completed well before you receive your referral.

CCCWA

Cathy Murphy was recently in China and met with many departments at the CCCWA. I had asked Cathy to try to obtain some concrete information on our 5 remaining families in the mainstream program, which she did.

Cathy met with Vice-Director General Chu who said that they could only commit to matching 1 of our families files over the next two years. There just aren't any "healthy" children waiting for families.

The CCCWA have matched up to January 15, 2007. They are unable to tell us when any family can expect a referral and in fact, issued a memo to all agencies stating that they will no longer be matching by date stamp.

I know this is probably not the news you wanted to hear but this is the information that we received and important for you all to know.

We have a very good relationship with the CCCWA and will continue to work with them to complete the remaining adoption files.

We continue to contact the CCCWA who have told us all programs are currently "on hold" until they receive direction from Civil Affairs regarding the new NGO law and it's implementation.

Many of the children currently on the shared list are children in the Special Focus Group with higher special medical needs.

We currently have 14 families with their dossiers logged in at the CCCWA and 3 families in the process of completing their Homestudy/Dossier. We have 17 families in process in our WC China Program.

All families in process received a Memo from The Children's Bridge regarding the new NGO law which will be implemented by Civil Affairs in China. The CCCWA has said there is currently "a hold" on their operations while this new law is being implemented. We will update our families in the coming weeks

as we receive more information on these changes and what they will mean for families in process.

New families coming into this program who are considering an adoption through our WC China Program must be open to adopting a boy over 7 years of age with special medical needs. In the past year, The Children's Bridge has placed a large number of boys with our families, and we have been told by the CCCWA that the WC China Program is becoming an older child adoption program with older boys waiting for families.
